Judging and art exhibition is always a wonderful and rewarding experience. That is the case with this year's Latrobe Art Center Annual Exhibition. I was both challenged and delighted to review the work of artists ranging in experience from tiny beginners to long established professionals. It was so exciting to see the use of the many mediums applied within these wonderful pieces. It's initially overwhelming to see so many excellent efforts with just a few awards to assign. At first the task feels impossible, to reduce the overall pool to just a few, and above that declare a "Best of Show" with so many worthy contenders.
